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
National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation (NTDR) on September 30th is designated as an opportunity to recognize and commemorate the legacy of residential schools. It was originally proposed in 2015 by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada; Call to Action #80 called upon the federal government, in collaboration with Indigenous peoples, to establish a statutory holiday "to honour Survivors, their families, and communities, and ensure that public commemoration of the history and legacy of residential schools remains a vital component of the reconciliation process."

September 30th has been observed since 2013 as <u>Orange Shirt Day</u>, a movement to recognize the colonial legacy of residential schools and commit to the ongoing process of reconciliation. Orange Shirt Day recalls the experience of residential school Survivor Phyllis Webstad.

NTDR has been created under the Canada Labour Code, meaning this is a statutory holiday <u>for employees in the federal government and federally regulated workplaces in Canada</u>. While this day is not mandated provincially, we acknowledge that we are recognizing it in our workplaces, to honour survivors, and ensure commemoration in different ways.

Meaningful relationships serve as the front line of economic reconciliation with Canada's Indigenous Peoples; doing business together serves the bottom line and will create stronger outcomes
